The Pimsleur method uses a sample of conversations to help you immerse yourself in the language, and give you useful answers and phrases for everyday situations. While there are some visual cues, it relies heavily on audio to deliver training. What we don't like is that Pimsleur can be too academic in places and will be bored after months of use. Learning may not always be fun, but you will need to motivate yourself to push through from intermediate to more advanced stages. The high price of the software, however, should motivate most people.
